She said "Stay 'n' Play was obviously there (in Marks Gate) for years and years, but when the pandemic hit, it closed. No one knew what was going on. People have moved out of the estate. People have moved in. No one knows about it."

The club is a valuable resource in the community that parents should take advantage of. The sense of community in Marks Gate is second to none and Stay 'n' Play enhances this by creating opportunities for parents to bond, not only with their children, but other parents too.

Aisha reiterated that "Stay 'n' Play is for everybody. It doesn't matter about your income, race, sexual orientation, it's open to anyone. If you have children, come along."

So don't forget – Stay 'n' Play is open every Wednesday during term time from 12:30pm – 2:45pm at St Marks Church.


Pennu Charity is a new UK registered charity, established to promote good health and well-being of the elderly.


HVPA recognise the importance of community engagement and participation and through music we have delivered new opportunities for residents predominately in the Marks Gate and Chadwell Heath

The summer term at Rose Lane Primary has been a busy one and our pupils continue to amaze us with their resilience throughout the assessment season. A new addition to our curriculum this year was Future Selves week. Each day was focused on a different area of industry; Monday was the Creative Arts, Tuesday was Science and Engineering, Wednesday was Sports and Public Service, Thursday was Business and Enterprise and Friday was Future Aspiration day.

Each day the children participated in a whole range of lessons learning about different careers and trying out skills

and activities associated with them. We had a range of visitors from musicians to the police and many of the pupils have since been commenting about what they aspire to be in the future. On day one a pupil in Year 2 told me he wanted to be a guitar playing, architect, drummer when he grows up, so by Friday he probably had ten future careers lined up!! One of the children's favourite moments was a visiting scientist launching rockets on our school field.

On the final day the children came dressed as their future selves and we had a whole range of professions including doctors, engineers, teachers, artists, football players and future Olympians. They wrote letters to their future selves and even tried filling out job application forms. The final task was an Apprentice Challenge in which each class was given a small budget and challenged to make the most profit. Our Enterprise market was a sell-out!



Marks Gate Community Forum

A huge thank you to our fantastic MGCF members who took part in seven co-design workshops from the end of February to mid-May. The purpose was for residents from the local community to discuss and collaborate on design plans with our architect (Mae) and landscape designers (Planit) for the Linear Park, a new green space being created as part of the Padnall Lake development for existing and new residents to enjoy. The Forum shared ideas and feedback for play areas, leisure, and planting; whilst highlighting the importance of respecting the current community and trying to maintain the longstanding open character of the space.

This piece of work with the MGCF has now ended but our long-term goal is to continue working with the group on other projects in the future. Padnall Lake Phase 2 Public Consultation

We held a second public consultation for Padnall Lake phase 2 at the end of May to show the updated housing and landscape designs, reflecting how your comments from the public consultation in March had been considered alongside the outcomes of the Marks Gate Community Forum co-design workshops. Murphy Report



We held our event "Padnall Lake, Behind the hoardings" on the 30th March 2022 at St Mark's Church. A few of you joined us and HTA Design Landscape Architects to ask about our progress at Padnall Lake and see the exciting plans for the lake improvement works. We displayed images and a model to show how the development will look once completed.

Local nature enthusiast Graham Wallis visited us again in April to document the final stage of the fish



relocation in Padnall Lake. This process was carried out by experts from MEM Fisheries, who helped to move the fish to different parts of the lake, as we desilted and cleaned the water. You can see what happened and how the lake currently looks (following Graham's most recent visit a few weeks ago) via his YouTube channel, Naturally Curious UK.

In May, members of our team volunteered at Kallar Lodge residential care home to help improve their outdoor space that looks out onto Padnall Lake.

We repainted fences and benches, weeded the footpaths and completed two patio areas, where residents can now comfortably sit outside to enjoy the lake view and watch the wildlife.

Over the next few months, we plan to visit Rose Lane Primary School and The Warren School to provide site safety talks and support careers days where pupils can find out more about working in the construction industry.

<u>Improving Padnall Lake – Latest Updates</u>

Following completion of the lake de-silting, we have been busy:

- Installing gabions around the perimeter of the lake
- Backfilling and reshaping the bank behind the gabions with subsoil
- Completing wildfowl fencing across the gabion length
- Importing subsoil and topsoil to lay across the west and middle section of the lake
- Planting four new trees in the middle section
- Planting and seeding the west, middle and island areas
- Reconstructing footpaths by removing the old tarmac and installing a cellweb system to help protect against future damage
- Sowing wildflower seeds between the footpaths and lake
- Installing stepping logs across the middle section
- Laying the foundations for new benches, picnic tables and litter bins

There is more work to be carried out, including installation of street furniture and the dipping platform, however a small section of the public footpath to the west of the lake was reopened to residents in early June and our aim is to reopen the whole lake area by September 2022. We will share details in advance with you via dedicated newsletters, our site noticeboards and online at yourcall.befirst.london/marks-gate
